Willow Chance is a 12-year-old genius, obsessed with nature and diagnosing medical conditions, who finds it comforting to count by 7s. It Already socially isolated, her world is tragically changed when her parents both die in a car crash. Left alone in a baffling world, she takes on the challenge of facing her grief and building a diverse surrogate family.

In the Shadow of Blackbirds



Dessen, Sarah The Moon and More




King, A.S. **Reality Boy**
