


9:15-10:30 Keynote Speaker: Evan Dumas

"How Not to Burn Out" or "Whoops, too late, now what?"

Evan Dumas will be taking a humorous look at the serious issue of burnout in the workplace. We'll see how failing-to-thrive is a natural part of the thriving process, it just doesn't get as much press. By normalizing the challenges of goal-setting and self-care we'll all realize that no one is perfect at thriving and that's okay — and if there are perfect people they can kindly keep quiet while the rest of us figure this out.





PAPER SOCCER

The object of the game? Just like real soccer — get your "ball" into your opponent's goal! This is done one "kick" at a time. Use your pencil to kick instead of your foot. More "playing fields" can be found at the registration table.

How to play:

- * Your ball is on the center line of the field. Play starts from this point.
- * A round of rock, paper, scissors determines who goes first. Each player takes a side of the field and a goal.
- * The first player can move the ball vertically, horizontally, or diagonally into any of the surrounding squares. The ball can move one space per turn.
- * Draw a line on the field to show movement of the ball.
- * The next player "picks up" the ball from its last position and tries to move it back toward the opponent's goal.
- * The trick? No lines can be crossed. When play reaches the border of the field, the ball can be "bounced" back in any possible direction and the player gets another turn.
- * Both players need to strategize their moves so that the ball stays in play.
- * If a player gets to a point where she/he can't make any valid moves they are automatically out.

The winner is the first player to reach the opponent's goal!


PRESENTER BIOS IN ALPHABETICAL ORDER BY LAST NAME
