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The 1000 volume set of the nineteenth century British Parliamentary Papers, published by Irish University Press, is now available in Oregon as the result of a cooperative purchase by the NAPCU libraries and Portland State University. Most of the volumes are to be housed at PSU; indexes will be available at Lewis & Clark College, Reed, Willamette, Linfield, University of Portland, Pacific University, and Portland State. Volumes will be available for use either on site or via interlibrary loan.

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Mary Devlin (University of Portland) has been elected OLA representative to PNLA. She will succeed Louise Gerity (Lewis & Clark).

Virginia H. Parr (University of Oregon), head education-psychology librarian, is the editor of Behavioral & Social Sciences Librarian, a new quarterly journal published by The Haworth Press.

The charter issue contains a variety of practice-oriented, research and bibliographical articles, an annotated bibliography of publications that debate the claims of the paranormal, and a comprehensive review of journals about drug and alcohol abuse.

Perry D. Morrison, acting assistant university librarian at the U of O, is the author of the lead article, a review of information transfer studies. Perry is also on the editorial board.

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Lawrence Crumb (University of Oregon) has a booklet, Historic Preservation in the Pacific Northwest: a Bibliography of Sources, 1947-1978, recently published by the Council of Planning Librarian as CPL Bibliography no. 11 (vi, 57 p., \$7.00).

Lawrence also had a display, "Prayer Book Revision in England and America, 1549-1979", which was exhibited at the U of O library in October and at Reed College in December and January. The display traced successive revisions of The Book of Common Prayer.

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I recently had the pleasure and privilege of representing the Oregon chapter of ACRL at ALA's Midwinter Conference in Chicago. The purpose of the Midwinter Conference is getting the business of running ALA (and its sub-groups!) accomplished, as opposed to that of the Summer Conference where ALA and all its groups present programs to the library world at large.

I first attended a budget orientation session for State Chairmen, Section Chairmen, etc., learned the rules and regulations of ACRL's support of our activities, and completed our chapter's budget for fiscal year '80-'81. Next was a Chapters reception, attended by officers and members of ACRL Chapters from all over the country. I was told that I was the first Oregon Chairman ever to represent our chapter at these meetings, and this has been confirmed locally.

Early the next morning all ACRL Chapter Chairmen, who comprise the Chapters Council, met with the Chapters Committee, one of the official committees of ACRL, and with our liaison staff members at the national office. Each of us gave a brief report on past activities and plans for the future. A general discussion followed each report. This session in particular was a good one in which to gather ideas and, incidently, to make friends.

The main idea I gleaned was that almost every other chapter had both a Chairman and a Chairman-elect in attendance. This political structure insures continuity; and so, at the meeting of your Oregon Board of Directors on January 25, it was decided that at our Spring meeting we will elect a Chairman-elect who will become Chairman at the Fall meeting. At that Fall meeting we will elect a Chairman-elect for the following year.

The next official meeting was that of the national ACRL Board of Directors. We here in Oregon hope to receive funds from a local foundation to enable us to put on a complex and stimulating meeting next fall with national-level speakers and other exciting (but expensive) events. I found that writing a proposal in the name of ACRL requires the permission of the national Board. I therefore put our request on their long agenda and, in waiting for it to come up, learned a lot about how they operate. They gave us their "blessing" (their term) and even said, "Tell others to go and do likewise."

In between (and before and after) these sessions I attended other meetings of ACRL Committees, committees of other divisions, various Roundtables, and national committees. I came home tired but wiser and ready for a good year as your Chairman.

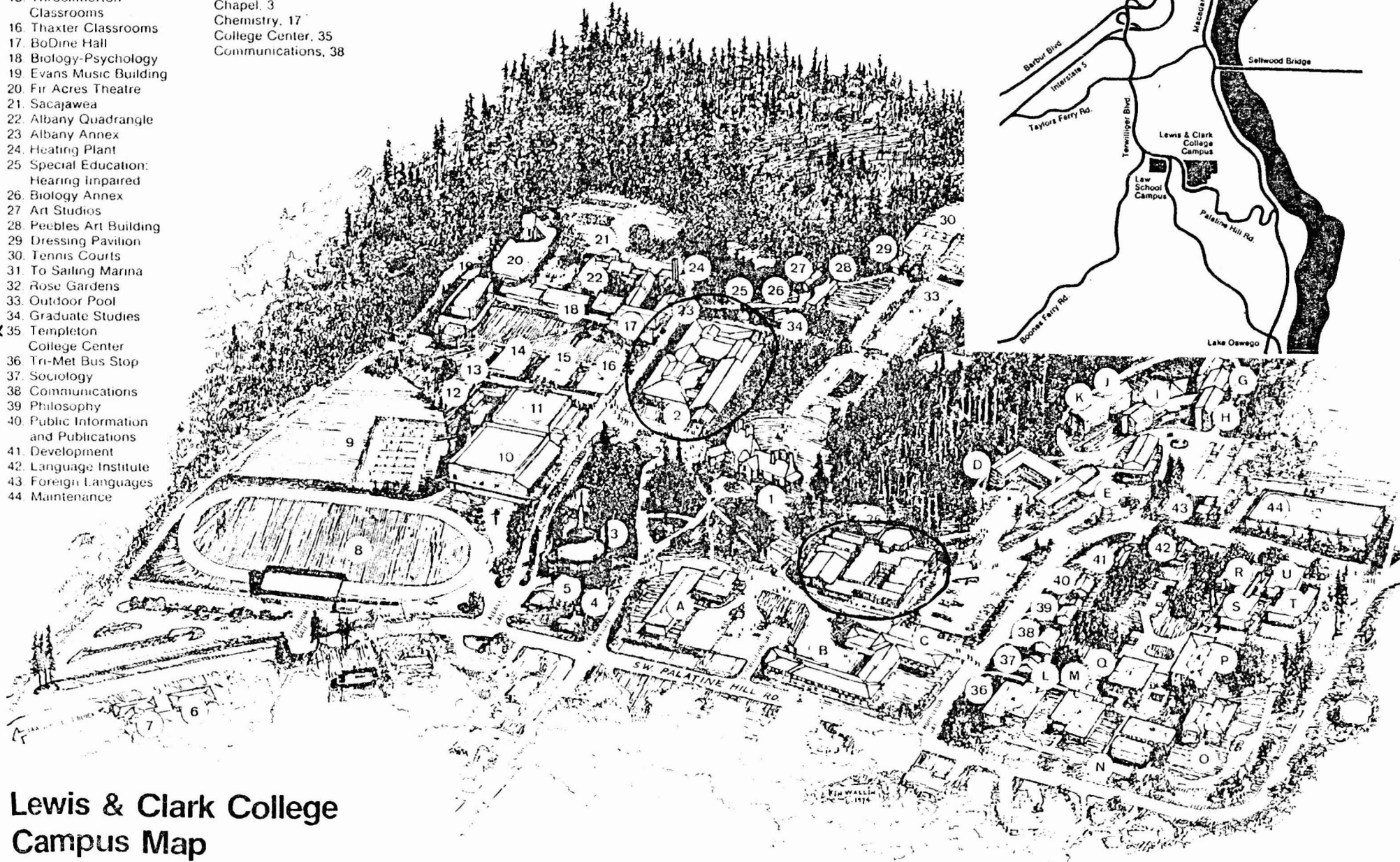
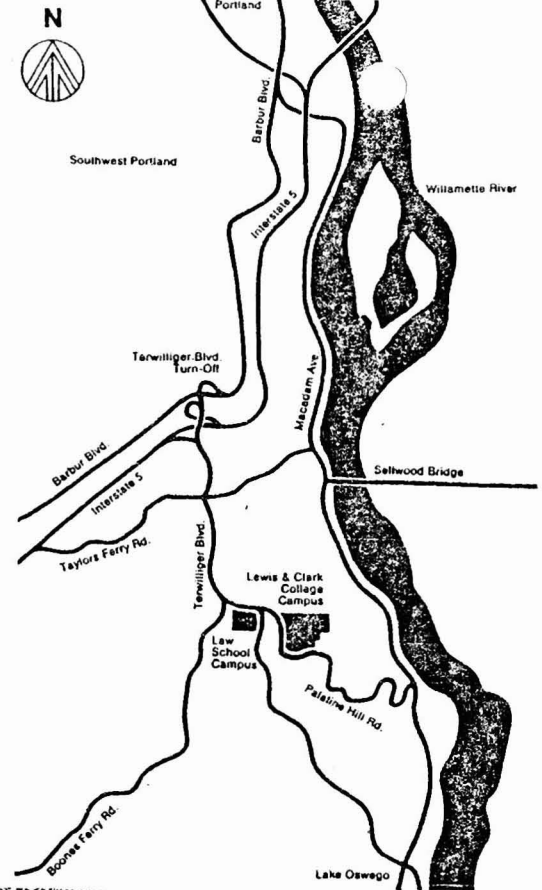
